SAFE SEAS 2006

On August 7-11, Harley Marine Services participated in the Safe Seas 2006 oil spill drill. Safe Seas 2006 was a multi-agency effort lead by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) in collaboration with the U.S. Coast Guard, California Office of Spill Prevention and Response, and Harley Marine Services. More than 400 people participated in training, field operations, oceanographic surveys, and incident command post activities. The exercise highlighted capabilities to organize an effective response team, deliver data, observations, forecasts, and expertise towards the goal of protecting life, commerce, and the environment during an emergency. The exercise scenario focused on a hypothetical collision of a bulk freight cargo ship M/V Blue Harp traveling in-bound to San Francisco with the barge Dottie in tow by the tug Ernest Campbell traveling out-bound from San Francisco resulting in an oil spill of over 500,000 gallons of IFO 180. There was extensive real time media coverage of the event throughout the SF Bay area.

Can LA's Ports Go Green?

The San Pedro Bay is home to the Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach – one of the largest port complexes in the world. It is then no surprise to most that the area has some of the worst air quality in the nation. The health concerns for the residents of the area and Southern California as a whole have led the ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach to come up with a plan that would turn the complex into the greenest port facility in the world. Officials from both ports and the South Coast Air Quality Management District met in March to create the Clean Air Action Plan. This plan lays out the sources of pollution in the San Pedro Bay, standards to decrease pollution, plans for the implementation of standards, and funding for the program.

Concerns about the feasibility of the Clean Air Action Plan have sparked since the program was first announced. In response, KPCC's AirTalk held a seminar during the first week of August titled "Can LA's Ports Go Green?" The seminar was held at the Port of Los Angeles with a panel composed of officials from the Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach, community leaders, and residents from the communities surrounding San Pedro Bay. The show's host and the panel discussed the concerns of the Clean Air Action Plan in further detail and allowed the public to share their concerns.

HEADS UP

The Shell Oil Company recently issued a warning after three incidents in which mobile phones ignited fumes during fueling automobiles.

In the first case, the phone was placed on the car's trunk lid during fueling; it rang and the ensuing fire destroyed the car and the gasoline pump. In the second, an individual suffered severe burns to their face when fumes ignited as they answered a call while refueling their car. And in the third, an individual suffered burns to the thigh and groin as fumes ignited when the phone, which was in their pocket, rang while they were fueling their car.

You should know that:

- * Mobile Phones can ignite fuel or fumes.
- * Mobile phones that light up when switched on or when they ring release enough energy to provide a spark for ignition.
 - * Mobile phones should not be used in filling stations, or when fueling lawn mowers or boats!
- * Mobile phones should not be used, or should be turned off, around other materials that generate flammable or explosive fumes or dust (i.e. solvents, chemicals, gases, grain dust, etc.).

To sum it up, here are the: Four Rules for Safe Refueling:

- * Turn off engine
- * Don't smoke
- * Don't use your cell phone leave it inside the vehicle or turn it off
- * Don't re-enter your vehicle during fueling

Millennium Star Assists the Cougar Ace Safely to Anchorage in Dutch Harbor, AK

On July 23rd, The Mitsui O.S.K. Lines car carrier Cougar Ace reported to the U. S. Coast Guard that the vessel had listed nearly 80 degrees to the port side and was still taking on water. The vessel was located about 230 miles southeast of the Aleutian Islands in the North Pacific. Fortunately, the ship's 22 crew members were safely rescued by the U. S. Coast Guard and Alaska Air National Guard. The 654 foot car carrier was bound for Canada with a full load a new cars. Although the exact cause for the incident had not been determined it has been said that there was a malfunction in the vessel's automatic ballasting system. In a joint effort, Titan Maritime LLC, the appointed salvor, enlisted the help of local Dutch Harbor Salvor, Dan Magone of Magone Marine Services to respond to the scene to determine a course of action to tow the vessel to a safe port.

On August 8th Cougar Ace was towed into Dutch Harbor and the two local tractor tugs, one being the Millennium Star, which is currently in Dutch Harbor replacing the Gyrfalcon, helped to assist the vessel to safe anchorage in Wide Bay. The pictures to the right shows the Millennium Star along side the keel of the vessel during this operation. Once the vessel was safely anchored, the process began to right the vessel, which was successful. The Millennium Star transported personnel to and from Dutch Harbor and the Cougar Ace while this effort was underway.



OLYMPIC SPIRIT 80,000 BBL. DOUBLE HULL TANK BARGE

The first keel panel for the Olympic Spirit was moved to the graving dock at Bay Ship Building in Sturgeon Bay, WI.

85% of the hull panels and modules are completed and the composition process has started in the graving dock. When the hull is completed the barge will be floated and moved to the fleeting dock where the machinery and all operational systems will be installed. When completed the barge will be moved pier side for a few weeks of system testing and acceptance. The barge is on schedule for a final acceptance and delivery to us by December 1, 2006.

Cooking with the Captain Captain Chris Starkenburg, Gyrfalcon - PCM Bow Tie Pasta Salad with Goat Cheese and Fresh Mozzarella

Ingredients:

1 16oz box of Bow Tie Pasta ½ cup Vegetable oil ¼ cup Kosher Salt

1 large sweet onion peeled and cut 10-12 Roasted Garlic Cloves 6 Mini Red Bell Peppers 6 Mini Yellow Bell Peppers 6 Mini Orange Bell Peppers 1/4 Cup Olive Oil 3 Tablespoons Balsamic Vinegar 1 Tablespoons Dijon Mustard

1 Teaspoon Fresh ground Pepper



1 bunch fresh spinach cleaned and washed sliced ½ inch julienne no stems ¾ cup Sun dried tomatoes Drained from oil and julienne 12-15 Fresh Basil leaves rolled like a cigar and sliced very thin 15 small fresh grape cherry tomatoes

3-4 oz. Low Fat Goat Cheese Crumbles 8 oz. Fresh mozzarella 1/4 inches cubed

½ cup olive oil 1 tablespoon Dijon Mustard ½ cup Balsamic Vinegar

Directions:

In a large 5 quart stock pot, bring water, salt and vegetable oil to a boil. Add the bow tie pasta and gently stir and reduce the heat so the water is at a slow boil. Cook the pasta Al Dente, this will help keep it from breaking apart. Drain and rinse in cold water until pasta is cooled, after it is cooled and still in the colander lightly drizzle with olive oil and set aside.

In a large bowl mix olive oil, balsamic vinegar, Dijon mustard and pepper until blended.

Then place the onions, garlic cloves and peppers in bowl and roll until everything is coated. Then place in a pre-heated BBQ (if you have a vegetable grilling screen, these work great from keeping the vegetables from falling threw the grating). Leave the remaining liquid in the bowl. Grill until they have some color and are still Al Dente then remove from the heat and place back in the bowl with liquid and gently top to coat.

In a large bowl, place the bow tie pasta, spinach, basil, grape tomatoes, roasted vegetables (with extra liquid in bowl), ½ of the goat cheese and mozzarella. Gently toss with your hands to evenly blend ingredients. At this time you can taste and add kosher salt and pepper to taste. Once blended transfer to a nice serving bowl and arrange some of the peppers around the edges and top with remaining cheese. Then drizzle with balsamic vinegar - Dijon sauce and garnish with a large Basil spring.

I leave extra sauce on the side in case your guest would like to add more.
